University Physicians Hospital has been certified as a NICHE facility, a "senior-friendly" hospital committed to meeting the special needs of hospitalized older adults.



Elective Rotations Elective rotations both in-town

Elective rotations, both in-town and out-oftown, require pre-planning to ensure the appropriate paperwork is completed prior to the start of the rotation.

The process begins by submitting an elective request form located on the FCM website under Current Residents. Please complete the on-line version as it must be typed so that information is legible. Two items must accompany the request: 1. a letter from the preceptor stating that they agree to accept you for the rotation, and 2. a calendar (signed by the preceptor) mapping out the planned schedule. The request will not be processed without this documentation.

Next, the rotation must be approved by Dr. Cagno and then by the GME office. The approval process typically takes up to three weeks. Once approved, the preceptor/ affiliation agreement is developed by the AHSC Contracting Office. The paperwork is sent to the preceptor for their review. One roadblock to their signing the agreement may involve their liability insurance. They must carry one million dollars in liability insurance. Once the agreement is signed by all parties, the process is complete.

If you are unsure of what you want to do or know what you want to do but not where to go, Sherry can discuss possible options. Don't wait until the last minute. Planning ahead is the key to success. Make the most of your elective time and enjoy time working and learning in areas of special interest to you.

The NICHE (Nursing Improving Care for Healthsystem Elders) designation is the result of strong collaboration between University Physicians Hospital and the UA Center on Aging, and was made possible through funding from the Arizona Geriatric Education Center. As a NICHE hospital, UPHK will implement a nationally recognized training program designed to bring the most current knowledge and skills in geriatric patient care to bedside nurses and hospital staff. The hospital will adopt clinical best practices for common and serious issues among hospitalized older adults - vision and hearing loss, medication problems, insomnia, falls and memory loss, for example - that often complicate their recovery.

The goal is to provide safe and quality care for seniors and achieve high patient, family and staff satisfaction. An exciting spinoff of this process is the identification of the need for an Acute Care of Elders (ACE) Unit at the hospital to prevent functional decline among frail adults; planning for this specialized unit is in progress.

Congratulations STFM Award Winner...

At the last Society of Teachers of Family Medicine conference in New Orleans, Dr. Patricia Lebensohn was presented with the STFM Innovative Program Award for the Integrative

Medicine in Residency Online Curriculum. The Integrative Medicine in Residency Online Curriculum is designed to be woven into the conventional training of primary care residents. The 200-hour online competency-based core curriculum fits into the usual residency training without



the need of adding an extra year of training such as in the IFM/MFR. The curriculum is modular and customizable by residency programs and offers a number of multimedia tools, for seamless education and point-of-care use. For the first time, integrative medicine is a required component of graduate medical education at eight residencies around the nation.
