Newborn/NICU – PGY 2

Goal: To provide appropriate family-centered care to healthy newborns, as well newborns in an intensive care setting.

Objectives:

Patient Care

- I. Assess and manage a newborn in the delivery room, including resuscitation and stabilization of a critically ill neonate.
 - 1. Describe normal physiologic changes in neonatal transition, signs of abnormal responses and strategies for their management.
 - 2. Demonstrate delivery room assessment of normal and high-risk newborns.

II. Provide comprehensive care in a Level I nursery.

- 1. Perform a complete neonatal history & physical examination, including gathering relevant maternal history, pregnancy history and social history.
- 2. Identify and describe abnormal physical examination findings and develop appropriate management plans.
- 3. Counsel parents on the benefits of breastfeeding and early bonding between baby and family.
- 4. Assess a newborn's nutritional status based on history (infant and maternal) and physical examination, and implement appropriate management plans.
- 5. Recognize and manage jaundice in the newborn period.
- 6. Recognize and manage common infections in newborns.

III. Perform procedures commonly used in the newborn nursery and NICU.

- 1. Understand indications for each procedure.
- 2. Counsel parents on the indications, risks, benefits and alternatives of procedures.
- 3. Obtain informed consent for needed procedures.
- 4. Interpret results from procedures performed.
- 5. Clearly document procedures performed.

IV. Provide anticipatory guidance to the parents of newborns.

- 1. Provide anticipatory counseling at nursery discharge that addresses the special needs of NICU newborns as appropriate.
- 2. Provide information and counseling on SIDS, car safety, nutritional needs, vaccination recommendations, and routine follow-up care.

Medical Knowledge

- I. Demonstrate a commitment to acquiring the knowledge needed for independent medical care of newborns.
 - 1. Interpret commonly performed clinical tests/imaging in the newborn nursery and NICU.
 - 2. Describe necessary medical equipment for neonatal resuscitation, and demonstrate its proper use.
 - 3. Integrate information from multiple sources (patients, parents, specialists, social workers) to formulate a comprehensive management plan.
 - 4. Develop management plans that consider family values and community resources.
 - 5. Anticipate potential outcomes (expected and unexpected) of common pediatric medical conditions in the newborn nursery or NICU.

Interpersonal and Communication Skills

- I. Demonstrate effective interpersonal skills with patients, families, and medical staff in a sensitive manner
 - 1. Present each patient's history, physical examination, relevant laboratory data and management plan to the attending physician and/or senior resident in a clear, concise, and organized manner.
 - 2. Communicate information to patients and patients' families with attention to privacy concerns and healthcare literacy that honors family values and enhances parenting skills and confidence.
 - 3. Write complete, accurate, well-organized notes that reflect a synthesis of relevant information from multiple sources in a timely manner.
 - 4. Communicate and work collaboratively with staff, consultants, and other healthcare providers to create and sustain an environment fostering a team-based approach to patient care
 - 5. Facilitate communication and transitions between the inpatient and outpatient setting.

Professionalism

- I. Carry out responsibilities reliably, timely, and confidentiality and showing respect for patients and other healthcare workers.
 - 1. Maintain appropriate appearance and behavior during interactions with patients, staff and colleagues.
 - 2. Identify limits of one's own medical knowledge and appropriately seek assistance when needed.
 - 3. Complete assigned duties (including accurate and timely completion of charting) in a timely manner.

Systems-Based Practice

- I. Be aware of the role of health care systems, and utilize resources in a manner that provides optimal care for neonates.
 - 1. Identify the role and scope of practice of general pediatricians, neonatologists, perinatologists, obstetricians, family physicians, nurse midwives, lactation consultants, nurses, and social workers in the care of a newborn, and work collaboratively with these professionals.
 - 2. Order diagnostic testing and referrals in a manner that reflects the provisions of cost-conscious care.
 - 3. Be an advocate for families needing assistance navigating the complex health-care system.

Practice Based Learning and Improvement

- I. Continually assess knowledge and patient care practices and utilize information to stimulate self-directed learning.
 - 1. Demonstrate knowledge, skills and attitudes needed for continuous self-assessment, using scientific methods and evidence to investigate, evaluate, and improve one's patient care practice in the nursery setting and neonatal intensive care unit.
 - 2. Identify guidelines for diagnosis and treatment of common conditions, and adapt them to the individual needs of specific patients.
