Palliative and Hospice Goals and Objectives 2015-16

GOALS:

To develop the knowledge, attitudes, and skills necessary to effectively participate in the care of patients requiring pain management and/or palliative care.

OBJECTIVES:

PATIENT CARE/MEDICAL KNOWLEDGE

- 1. Describe the hospice philosophy, services and the population served.
- 2. Classify pain by pathophysiology and describe differences in management.
- 3. Calculate conversion doses of commonly used opioids and write appropriate medication orders for pain management.
- 4. Describe how physical, psychosocial, emotional and spiritual factors impact hospice care and effective grieving.
- 5. Name common symptoms encountered in the terminal phase and discuss etiologies and management strategies.
- 6. Be able to effectively manage symptoms related to end of life care, such as but not limited to pain management, delirium, nausea, vomiting, and constipation.
- 7. State the four outcomes of the National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization related to end-of-life care.
- 8. Value: let the family know that you value the time you have with them.
- 9. Acknowledge family's emotions and acknowledge presence/name of everyone present by polite brief introductions.
- 10. Listen more than you speak (especially avoid any unsolicited technical info and explanations such as "creatinine is getting worse"),
- 11. Understand the patient as a person (such as what did the patient enjoy doing before they got sick).
- 12. Elicit questions (there usually aren't many if steps 1-4 are done in a thoughtful warm comforting manner).

PRACTICE-BASED LEARNING AND IMPROVEMENT

- 1. Identify and acknowledge gaps in personal knowledge and skills in the care of hospice and palliative care patients.
- 2. Describe how personal experiences with grief and loss may impact Interactions with patients and families.
- 3. Use Information technology and evidence-based medicine when available/appropriate to optimize patient care.

INTERPERSONAL AND COMMUNICATION SKILLS

1. Demonstrate communication skills with dying patients and their families regarding treatment decision-making and end-of-life care, including how to appropriately and compassionately deliver bad news.

- 2. Understand and be able to participate in goals of care (GOC) conversations and help with prognostication as it relates to a patient's medical Illness at the end of life.
- 3. Interpret the role of the physician in addressing psycho-spiritual needs of patient and family.
- 4. Demonstrate effective communication skills with patients/families.
- 5. Demonstrate effective communication skills with the medical team.
- 6. Educate patients and families effectively about the diagnoses and treatment plans/options.
- 7. Obtain Informed consent from patients and/or legal representatives.
- 8. Document patient care thoroughly and accurately in the medical chart.

PROFESSIONALISM

- 1. Demonstrate respect for patients/families.
- 2. Demonstrate respect for the medical team.
- 3. Maintain patient privacy and confidentiality.

SYSTEM5-BASED PRACTICE

- 1. Identify the members of the Interdisciplinary Group and state their primary roles and functions in the care of patients I families.
- 2. Reflect cost-consciousness when considering diagnostic and therapeutic options.
- 3. Recognize presentations that warrant consultation with a specialist or other health care provider.
- 4. Recognize the role of the patient's PCP as well as other health care providers in the management of patients requiring palliative and end of life care.
