Urgent Care - PGY1

Goal: To develop the knowledge and skills necessary to identify and address urgent care problems that present to the family physician.

Objectives:

Patient Care

- I. Provide medical care for patients presenting to urgent-care settings.
- 1. Efficiently and rapidly gather essential and accurate information about patients' presenting complaints.
- 2. Perform an appropriate, focused history and physical exam, including gathering needed data and ordering appropriate diagnostic testing.
- 3. Develop a thorough but concise differential diagnosis for the presenting problem(s).
- 4. Recognize and provide appropriate stabilization for emergencies, and assess the need for transfer to a higher level of care.
- II. Perform common urgent care procedures under the supervision of an attending physician
 - 1. Understand indications for each inpatient procedure.
 - 2. Counsel patients on the indications, risks, benefits and alternatives of procedures.
 - 3. Obtain informed consent for needed procedures.
 - 4. Clearly document procedures performed.

Medical Knowledge

- 1. Interpret information from multiple sources, including the patient, his/her family, as well as laboratory data and diagnostic testing to identify a final diagnosis and develop a management plan.
- 2. Anticipate potential outcomes (expected and unexpected) of common medical conditions in the urgent care setting.
- 3. Demonstrate correct interpretation of chest x-rays.

Interpersonal and Communication Skills

- 1. Communicate information to patients and patients' families with attention to privacy concerns and healthcare literacy
- 2. Write complete, accurate, well-organized notes that reflect a synthesis of relevant information from multiple sources.
- 3. Provide discharge information to patients empathetically using reflective listening techniques.
- 4. Present patients concisely and accurately by telephone to other clinicians for consultation.
- 5. Communicate and work collaboratively with staff, other physicians and healthcare providers to create and sustain an environment fostering a team-based approach to patient care.

Professionalism

- 1. Arrive punctually to sign out, rounds and other residency duties.
- 2. Complete required documentation and clinical tasks in a timely manner.
- 3. Demonstrate emotional maturity, including respectful communication with patients and other members of the healthcare team.
- 4. Identify limits of one's own medical knowledge and appropriately seek assistance when needed.

Systems-Based Practice

I. Provide medical care in a cost-conscious manner.

- 1. Recognize and address social and financial barriers to care.
- 2. Utilize consultants and ancillary services when medically appropriate.
- 3. Ensure that all patients receive appropriate care, including being able to obtain necessary medications and follow-up testing.
- 4. Prescribe medications and follow-up testing as medically appropriate.
- 5. Utilize clinical pathways and disease management guidelines to ensure quality care is provided.

II. Demonstrate an attention to patient safety.

- 1. Recognize medical errors when they occur, including "near misses."
- 2. Utilize available systems to report medical errors in an effort to improve medical care in the future.
- 3. Utilize appropriate and available protocols, including checklists, to maximize patient safety.

Practice Based Learning and Improvement

- 1. Formulate relevant, searchable, clinical questions.
- 2. Utilize evidence-based resources to investigate clinical questions that arise when caring for patients.
- 3. Identify areas for further learning and improvement based on feedback and self-assessment.
- 4. Demonstrate an attitude of self-improvement by seeking out and being receptive to feedback.
- 5. Give feedback to junior learners on the team (medical students).
- 6. Begin to teach junior learners (medical students) pertinent clinical skills and medical knowledge.
